

NOTRE DAME'S ROME GLOBAL GATEWAY PROGRAMS



All Roads Lead to Rome... Including yours! Benvenuti a Roma!

Notre Dame's Rome Global Gateway is nestled at the heart of the city of Rome in the Celio neighborhood, just two blocks away from Notre Dame's Villa, the residential living-learning community. The RGG offers a variety of programs located throughout the capital city of Italy, home to nearly 3 million people. As a student in Rome, you will find yourself in one of the most inspiring places in the world: the Eternal City with its nearly 30 century long history, its archaeological sites, its monuments, its museums housed in Renaissance palaces, its churches and squares, villas and parks will be your classroom.

Students in all Rome programs will take two courses through the Rome Global Gateway:

- *All Roads Lead to Rome*, a 3-credit core course on the city of Rome, its art, architecture and literature through its nearly 3000 year long history, taught visiting the major archaeological sites, monuments and museums in the city. This course satisfies the University requirement in history, art history or literature (old and new core curriculum);
- one Community Based Learning (CBL) 1 credit course taught in partnership with one or more local institutions/organizations.

Students in Rome will have the opportunity to do internships in a variety of areas and disciplines that may be taken for credit, as well as to engage in community service with many local organizations.

According to each individual program, students will have the option to either reside at the Notre Dame Villa, a beautiful historical building renovated in 2017, mere steps from the ND Rome Global Gateway, or to choose homestays with Italian families.

Programs offered in Rome

Rome International Scholars Program

Notre Dame International and the Rome Global Gateway offer an international scholars in Rome program for a small number (8-10) of select undergraduates recruited from across disciplines and departments. This is a special program that is designed for self-motivated students who would value the opportunity to undertake independent research during one semester of Junior year that would ideally lead to senior thesis projects during senior year, and/or subsequent development of post-graduate research, including post-graduate fellowships and post-graduate studies. A key feature of the program is the opportunity for experiential learning, which can take the form of either an internship or service engagement to be conducted in Rome. Besides *All Roads Lead to Rome* and the CBL course students will study at a local university, and pursue their own research interests.

Students admitted to the Rome International Scholars Program are eligible for funding for further language and/or disciplinary study and/or internship in Italy during the summer following their semester in Rome.

During their time in Rome, students in the Rome International Scholars program will live with Italian host families.

Rome Undergraduate Program

Besides All Roads Lead to Rome and one Community Based Learning course, students will take at least one Italian language or literature course and conduct coursework at John Cabot University (JCU).

[John Cabot University](#) is a private, independent, four-year university in the Eternal City with strong ties to the American educational experience. JCU is located in the center of Rome in the historic Trastevere quarter, a few steps from the Tiber River, the Villa Farnesina—a lavish Renaissance palace—and the Botanical Gardens of the University of Rome.

During their time in Rome students in the Rome Undergraduate Program will have the option to reside at the Notre Dame Villa or live with a host family.

Rome - AME

Students in the Rome - AME program will take All Roads Lead to Rome and the 1 credit Community Based Learning course, one 2nd Theology course and three Engineering courses taught by ND Faculty and Faculty from Sapienza University, the first and leading university of Rome.

Students will reside at the Notre Dame Villa.

Rome - Summer

The six-week summer program at Notre Dame's Rome Global Gateway takes students on a journey through the city's storied landscape while introducing them to contemporary Italian culture. Students will choose 2 courses from the courses listed below:

- *All Roads Lead to Rome*. This course fulfils the University requirement in history, literature, or fine arts/art (old and new core curriculum).

- *THEO 24611, Catholic Social Tradition and Migration*, offers a survey of humanity's essential dimension of being on the move and analyses the fundamental theological, anthropological, and moral questions that arise from this. This course fulfils the 2nd theology University requirement (old and new core curriculum).

- *PHILO 24350, Renaissance Philosophy*. The course will examine the development of the concepts of man, nature, and God during the Renaissance, reflecting upon how philosophers tackled these themes at the time. It fulfils the 2nd philosophy University requirement (old and new core curriculum).

- *Italian language classes:*

- ROIT 14102 - Beginning Italian II

- ROIT 24201 - Intermediate Italian I

Students in the Rome Summer Program will reside at the Notre Dame Villa.
